

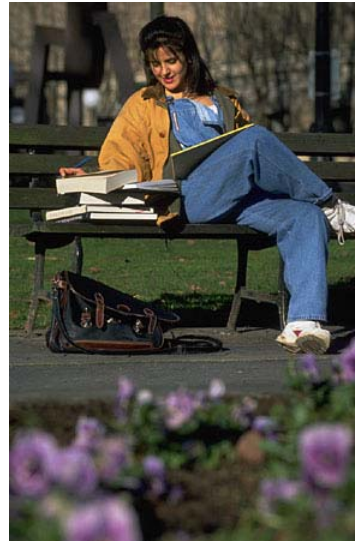

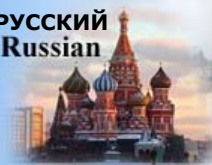

THE CENTER

The Language Teaching Center (LTC), established in 1992, offers language courses that are not taught in the language and literature departments.

Languages currently offered in the Language Teaching Center are Arabic, Chinese, English for International Teaching Assistants, Hindi, Japanese, Kiswahili, Korean, Persian/Farsi, Russian, and Sanskrit. Together with the departments, it sponsors a teaching development seminar for graduate assistants and faculty. The LTC also offers evening, non-credit English as a Second Language (ESL) courses for professionals, as well as an Intensive English Language Program (IELP) for visiting and pre-college students during the summer.

The center is also responsible for the Language Laboratory, which serves all Homewood campus language programs including French, German, Italian, Portuguese, and Spanish.

Facilities

The Language Laboratory, located on the fifth floor of Krieger Hall, provides in-lab and remote facilities for the use of multimedia materials and assists all foreign language departments in the selection and development of technology-based courseware for their programs. The facility supports individual learning at computerized workstations, as well as classroom instruction via a media distribution system. Satellite news broadcasts, recordings,

Minor and Double Major in Russian

The Goucher College-Johns Hopkins University Cooperative Program in Russian offers a full range of courses in Russian language, literature, and culture to be drawn upon for an area major in Humanistic Studies. All the literature courses are taught in Russian. Students have the opportunity to enroll in a five week summer immersion program in Moscow under the auspices of Language Link. A preparatory practicum in the spring semester at Goucher is an integral component of this highly recommended study abroad program which is specifically geared toward Hopkins and Goucher students.

The Russian minor is designed to give the student a command of both the written and spoken language and a deeper understanding of the cultural and literary development of the Russian people. It consists of six courses in Russian language, literature, and culture beyond the intermediate level.

Students may elect Russian as a second major. The Russian double major, consisting of ten courses above the intermediate level, is developed in cooperation with a member of the Goucher Russian Department. The student develops a course of study which typically includes a study abroad experience in Russia.
